

Cross-cultural Conversation in Therapy, Consultation, and Social Change

Diversity has become an everyday challenge for practicing therapists. Our society demands clinicians and consultants capable of dealing with diversity issues, such as race, class, religion, nationality, language, migration, culture, sexual orientation, etc. However, to be successful with diverse populations, therapists need to move beyond the safety of political correctness to compassionately embrace the ambiguity and challenge of working with multiple realities and possibilities.

This experience-based bilingual (English- Spanish) workshop will present the use of postmodern and social constructionist ideas to create successful conversations within multicultural practices. A live consultation will provide an opportunity to participate in the process of taking steps towards creating successful relationships and conversations with clients and institutions that address cultural beliefs and promote a safe and challenging environment open to newness and possibilities. Participants will be invited to become members of an intimate small learning community and to take an active role in the live consultation process via a reflecting team and post-consultation dialogue and reflection.

1. learn how to address multicultural ideas and practices using a postmodern perspective.
2. experience and practice a consultation from a postmodern perspective.
3. analyze and discuss the application of postmodern ideas in different clinical settings.
